1. Objectives

The report gives a summary of findings of the survey on the non-academic background of new full-time local undergraduate students admitted by Lingnan University in the year 2020/21. The findings may facilitate the planning of student services and facilities. The data will also be useful to academic staff and other interested parties in knowing more about our newly-admitted students.

2. Methodology

The survey was conducted from Aug to Sep 2020. All new full-time local undergraduate students were invited to complete the survey via Moodle platform. Participation was entirely voluntary.
