- # Under the revamped English Language Enhancement (ELE) programme, students will be grouped under two streams. Group A students are those who obtained level 3 in HKDSE English or equivalent while Group B students are those who obtained level 4 or above in HKDSE English or equivalent. Students are encouraged to take their first required ELE course, viz. LUE1001 for Group A and LUE1002 for Group B, in First Term of Year 1. However, they are given the flexibility to take the respective courses in Second Term of Year 1. For Group A students who take LUE1001 in Second Term of Year 1, they should take LUE1002 in First Term of Year 2. - ⁺ For students admitted via faculty-based admission, in Year 1, Group A students will study a total of 3 courses from the categories of ELE Elective and Free Elective, with a maximum of 1 ELE elective, while Group B students will study a total of 4 courses from the above-mentioned categories, with a maximum of 2 ELE electives; in Year 2, students will study PHI1002 Introduction to Philosophy, PHI1003 Ethics: East and West (unless they have already completed these subjects); and from Year 2 to Year 4, students will study a total of 7 courses from the categories of ELE Elective and Free Elective.

REQUIREMENTS IN PHILOSOPHY

There are altogether 48 credits in the major discipline. The Philosophy discipline requires students to take 10 required courses (30^ - 33^^credits) and either 6 programme elective courses (18 credits) together with a research seminar (3^ credits) or 5 elective courses (15 credits) in conjunction with a final year project (6^^ credits). A final year project may be terminated possibly with the award of only 3 credits after one term, in the event that the student's progress is not satisfactory. In that case, the student will need to complete the research seminar (3 credits) in addition.
